

He is about to leave whenshe gives him a flower, telling him to return it when it has wilted, whichwill be the very next day. After the guests leave, Violetta wonders ifAlfredo could actually be the one in her ACT II:

life. But she concludes that sheneeds freedom to live her life (Violetta, Alfredo: Sempre libera – "Alwaysfree"). From off stage, Alfredo's voice is heard singing about love as hewalks down the street. Scene 1a. Three months later, Alfredo and Violetta are living together in apeaceful country house outside Paris. Violetta has fallen in love withAlfredo and she has completely abandoned her former life. Annina, themaid, arrives from Paris, and, when questioned by Alfredo, tells him thatshe went there to sell the horses, carriages and everything owned byVioletta to support their country lifestyle.Alfredo is shocked to learn this and leaves for Paris immediately to settlematters himself. Violetta returns home and receives an invitation from herfriend, Flora, to a party in Paris that evening. Alfredo's father, GiorgioGermont, is announced and demands that she break off her relationshipwith his son for the sake of his family, since he reveals that Violetta's relationship with Alfredo has threatened his daughter's engagement because of Violetta's reputation. She responds that she cannot end therelationship because she loves Alfredo so much, but Giorgio pleads withher for the sake of his family. With growing remorse, she finally agreesand says goodbye to Giorgio. Violetta gives a note to Annina to send to Flora accepting the partyinvitation and, as she is writing a farewell letter to Alfredo, he enters. Shecan barely control her sadness and tears; she tells him repeatedly of herunconditional love Amami Alfredo. Before rushing out and setting off forParis, she hands the farewell letter to her servant to give to Alfredo. As soon as he has read it, Giorgio returns and attempts to comfort hisson. Alfredo suspects that the Baron is behind his separation from Violetta, and the party invitation, which he finds on the desk, strengthenshis suspicions. He decides to confront Violetta at the party. Giorgio triesto stop Alfredo, but he rushes out.

arrives with Baron Douphol. They see Alfredo at the gamblingtable. When he sees them, Alfredo loudly proclaims that he will takeVioletta home with him. Feeling annoyed, the Baron goes to the gamblingtable and joins him in a game. As they bet, Alfredo wins some large sumsuntil Flora announces that supper is ready. Alfredo leaves with handfuls ofmoney. Fearing that the Baron's anger will lead him to challenge Alfredo to a duel, Violetta gently asks Alfredo to leave. Alfredo misunderstands herapprehension and demands that she admit that she loves the Baron. Ingrief, she makes that admission and, furiously, Alfredo calls the guests towitness what he has to say. He humiliates and denounces Violetta in frontof the guests and then throws his winnings at her feet in payment for herservices. She faints onto the floor. ACT III: Dr. Grenvil tells Annina that Violetta will not live long since hertuberculosis has worsened. Alone in her room, Violetta reads a letter fromAlfredo's father telling her that the Baron was only wounded in his duelwith Alfredo. He has informed Alfredo of the sacrifice she has made forhim and his sister; and he is sending his son to see her as quickly aspossible to ask for her forgiveness. But Violetta senses it is too late. Annina rushes into the room to tell Violetta of Alfredo's arrival. Thelovers are reunited and Alfredo suggests that they leave Paris.But it is

too late: she knows her death approaches. Alfredo's father enterswith the

doctor, regretting what he has done. Violetta suddenly revives, exclaiming

that the pain and discomfort have left her. A moment later, shedies in

Alfredohave separated, much to the amazement of everyone who had

previouslyseen the happy couple. She calls for the entertainers to perform
